ABOUT US

The modern Ballarat Foundation's path to community philanthropy in Ballarat had its beginnings more than 40 years ago, when the Ballarat Community Fund was first created.

The community fund morphed through the leadership of both United Way Ballarat and the Ballarat Foundation to create an incredible legacy of community giving which is sustained today through Ballarat Foundation United Way Inc and its associated charitable entities.

Ballarat Foundation United Way Inc (BFUW) is registered as a charity with the Australian Charities and Not-For-Profits Commission and a member of Community Foundations Australia and Philanthropy Australia. BFUW is a Public Benevolent Institution and has Deductible Gift Recipient (DGR1 status).

Ballarat Foundation Charitable Fund Limited provides a vehicle for donors wishing to support non-benevolent causes, with community needs in areas such as natural resources and the environment, further education and leadership and positive cultural outcomes.

These entities support giving in all its forms, aligned to our vision, mission and values.

The Ballarat Foundation delivers a community foundation model which has benefited regions across the globe.

Under this model, donations to our sub funds are retained as capital and pooled to build a perpetual fund, with the income from this capital used to deliver local community grants.

To grow our capital funds, the foundation contracts leading investment firm JB Were Philanthropic Services to manage our portfolio.

The foundation is also developing its site in the centre of Ballarat's historic Lydiard St to create the Ballarat Community Hub, supporting non-for-profit and volunteer-involving organisations.

In 2023, the board of the Ballarat Foundation is led by chair Wayne Weaire. Mr Weaire has an extensive history in business and philanthropic leadership and was a founding director of Australian Community Philanthropy. The board is comprised of directors with a diverse skillset and experiences with a common

interest in making the Ballarat region a better place to live and work.

The Board are responsible for approving any distributions from funds to programs or organisations through the annual grants program. The Allocations Committee makes recommendations to the board following a rigorous application and assessment process. Community representatives take an active role in grant assessment processes.

Ballarat Foundation CEO Andrew Eales has more than 20 years' experience in business leadership and was a director for six years before being appointed CEO in February 2020.

EVIDENCE DRIVES OUR FOCUS

“The Vital Signs platform will provide ongoing factual evidence to support decisions on where the Ballarat Foundation focuses its granting and responses to community needs.”

In November 2022, the Ballarat Foundation released its Vital Signs report.

Previously conducted by the foundation in 2011, Ballarat Vital Signs is a community pulse check utilising data to provide insights on important social indicators within Ballarat and surrounding regions.

The project involved the publication of the Ballarat Vital Signs 2022 report and creation of a new online data portal which will be ongoing community tool measuring changes in social indicators.

The Vital Signs platform will provide ongoing factual evidence to support decisions on where the Ballarat Foundation focuses its granting and responses to community needs.



Ballarat Vital Signs is a partnership between the Ballarat Foundation and Seer Data and Analytics and includes more than 100 indicators relevant to Ballarat and central Victoria from multiple data sources, including the 2021 Census, Victorian Crime Statistics, the Torrens Social Atlas and Australian Bureau of Statistics.

Key findings of the 2022 report were:

- The rate of long-term health problems in young people in Ballarat is alarmingly high. The rate of mental health illness in Ballarat is significantly high, particularly with young adults. 19.08% of 25–34-year-old Ballarat residents suffer from mental illness, 67.81% higher than the rest of Victoria at 11.37% and 69% higher than the rate in Australia at 11.29%.

- Household money available after rent or mortgage are both less than Victoria and Australia averages – highlighting cost of living challenges.
- In 2021, the rate of family violence common assault in Ballarat was 24.2 per 10,000 persons, approximately 12% higher than Victoria with a rate of 21.5. Family violence common assault in Ballarat peaked in 2018 with a rate of 26.9 per 10,000 persons.

GRANT PROGRAMS

Our community impact grant program provides more than \$150,000 in distributions annually to projects and programs designed to positively impact Ballarat and region.

Ballarat Innovation Grant

Established in 2022, the Ballarat Innovation Grant provides a once-off \$50,000 grant to a new project or innovative response to community needs.

The purpose is to promote new and proactive thinking about driving change and is the largest grant currently on offer annually.

For future grant rounds, the focus of the project must be aligned to needs as identified in the Ballarat Foundation's Vital Signs report to be eligible for this program.

Community Impact Grants

Grants are available up to \$7500 across focus areas including housing security, food security, early childhood development, mental health and youth success. The focus areas of community impact grants will evolve as data becomes available from the Vital Signs platform and in consideration of sub fund representative wishes.

The Courier Charity Fund Grants

Two grants of up to \$15,000 each are available in support of projects aligned to the Ballarat Foundation's area of impact focus.

Wendouree Delacombe Fund Grants

Up to \$20,000 is made available annually to projects specifically targeted at supporting the Wendouree and Delacombe communities.

Ballarat Women's Fund Grants

Established in 2023, the Ballarat Women's Fund is a member-based fund which aims to distribute more than \$500,000 in the next 10 years to projects which support change and better outcomes for women in the Ballarat region in areas such as family violence, economic disadvantage and education.



Peter Amor Sports Participation Fund Grants

Up to \$10,000 is made available annually to projects which encourage participation by young people in sporting pursuits.

Matthew George Young Stockman Award

This award was established in memory of Matthew George, who lived in the Lake Goldsmith Stockyard Hill area in Victoria all his life and was passionate about agriculture and the cattle industry. Matthew died in November 2007, aged 21, as a result of a motor vehicle crash close to home. Since 2009, many young people from the industry have undertaken international study tours through support from the Young Stockman Award.

Tas; Wendouree West Exodus Community Church; Ballarat Basketball; Redan Football Netball Club; YMCA Ballarat Youth Services; A Pot of Courage; Ballarat and District Aboriginal Cooperative; Ballarat Tool Library; Café 102 Meals Program; Ballarat East Neighbourhood House; Mercy Connect; Ballarat Toy Library; Ballarat Regional Multicultural Council; Wendouree Neighbourhood Centre; Centacare; Eureka Mums; Ballarat Men's Mental Health; Compassionate Ballarat; Sebastopol Football and Netball Club; Ballarat City Football Club, Highlands LLEN; PINARC; Raven Collective; Hand in Hand; Homes to Help.

SUCCESS STORIES

COVID crisis response

In 2020, the Ballarat Foundation enabled an immediate local response to the COVID crisis. Bringing together donors and services providers, the foundation partnered with the Salvation Army and Ballarat Community Health to deliver 240 food packages each fortnight to families, international students and migrant refugees.

Utilising volunteers from the L2P program to distribute the packages, thousands of Ballarat residents were supported as the health and economic challenges associated with the pandemic.

This program highlighted the foundation's role in leading a positive local response through philanthropy and partnerships.

Life skills, Activities, Relationships, Friendship & Fun (LARF) program

The LARF program, operated in Ballarat by the Salvation Army, is provided to children and youth who experience social isolation due to homelessness, family violence, poverty, and substance abuse and / or family breakdown.

The program format is based on the matching of trained 16-25 year old volunteer mentors with young people 8-16 years of age.

One Ballarat participant is Toby*, a 15 year old. He is the primary adult at home despite his age, caring for both his mother and younger brother. Toby is responsible for getting himself and his brother to school, cooking meals, cleaning and grocery shopping. He also cares for his mother and assists her with her medical needs.

Since joining the LARF program, Toby has had the opportunity to enjoy a childhood by not

having to be the responsible adult. He initiates in games of imaginary play, tag and hide and seek, and enjoy fun and games like any other child would. Over time, this has had a positive impact on his social network, self-confidence and development. He has improved in his school performance and has a clear career pathway that has been set in motion.

When Toby graduates from the LARF program, he will continue his education through to Year 12 and he has been employed part time for over 3 years. The LARF program provided Toby with space, support, freedom to grow and community connection to pursue his passions and succeed in adulthood. **Not his real name*

Raven Collective

Established in 2022, the Ballarat Innovation Grant provides a once-off \$50,000 grant to a start-up project or innovative response to drive community impact. The first recipient of the grant was Raven Collective.

Raven Collective is a paid work experience program offered to women who have experienced domestic or family violence. Founder of Raven Collective, Natalie Illingworth, has 15 years of experience of working with homelessness and housing security at various government departments and charity groups. Natalie came up with the idea of Raven Collective during the pandemic when she saw how badly the rate of family violence was increasing.

Raven Collective receives referrals from WRISC to employ women as part of their training program. Women help with the packing of the gift boxes but also receive work experience and training in ordering stock, social media and communications. Women also engage with the Ballarat Neighbourhood Centre Work Ready program. The ultimate goal is for them to be able access meaningful work and become financially independent.



DONOR STORIES

Peter Amor

Set up in Peter's honour by his family from funds generously bequeathed on his passing, the Peter Amor Sports Participation Fund helps young children from disadvantaged backgrounds to participate in sport by assisting with some of the financial barriers that may otherwise prevent this.



Peter was a founding member of the Ballarat Community Fund in 1983 and served on the Board of Directors for the Ballarat Foundation for many years.

Peter was passionate about keeping Ballarat money within Ballarat to help Ballarat people. Although he was a very private person, this motivated him to publicly say that he was donating money to the foundation in his will, in the hope it could encourage others to do the same.

Canny Family

When Leo and Elaine Canny purchased the Red Lion Hotel in 1977, they had a very good understanding that they needed to be an integral part of their community to succeed.

They had a clear vision that they wanted to be a great employer and provide a quality experience for their customers. But importantly they wanted to be a respected corporate citizen, giving back to their community in any way they could. They knew that running a hotel came with responsibilities and treated their license with great respect. This included fundraising, sponsorships and donations.



The Ballarat Foundation has been an outstanding vehicle for that vision to continue.

Val Sarah

Val Sarah was born in 1940 in Halifax, Yorkshire, England during the early months of World War II.

Her father's employer, mindful of the potential for this industrial city to be the target of bombing raids, urged his employees to evacuate their families to safety.

Now in her eighties, Val recognises the courage it must have taken for her mother to travel unaided with a 3-year-old son and 5-month-old baby daughter on a Polish ship zigzagging its way across the Atlantic in a blacked-out convoy to avoid the dreaded U-Boats, en route to Halifax, Nova Scotia.

The challenge continued as they crossed Canada on the Canadian Pacific Railroad, and lastly journeyed by ferry to Vancouver Island, to shelter with hitherto unknown elderly relatives on the paternal side of the family.



As the months wore on, Phyllis had to work, and the children were put into foster care. The Red Cross found a family for Val. Victor was the Customs Officer in Victoria harbour, Anna was a tiny, feisty, loving mother of two sons and one daughter. She wanted a companion for her daughter Judy.

From 1989 to 2004, Val worked as Community Liaison for Child and Family Services (Cafs), and it was there that she had an opportunity to observe the very high quality of their Foster Care Program.

Between 2004 and 2008, Val was privileged to serve on the board of the Ballarat Foundation, chairing the PR and Marketing Committee which was responsible for establishing the website and new branding, and initiating action on the foundation archive.

During her term on the board, so impressed was she by the ease and effective manner in which funds could be donated to needy recipients, that she donated the sum of \$10,000 to establish the Val Sarah sub-fund, designated to support the Regional Foster Care program run by Cafs.

EVENTS AND FUNDRAISING

Dancing with our Stars

Dancing with our Stars sees ten well-known and much-loved local identities battle it out on the dance floor for the glittering trophy and bragging rights to be named the Dancing with our Stars Champion.

Funds raised through Dancing with our Stars provide support to the Ballarat Foundation to undertake the important work we do locally to break cycles of disadvantage.

More than \$500,000 has been raised since the inaugural event in 2019.

Run for a Cause

Run for a Cause brings together schools, businesses and community groups to participate in a 10km run, a 5km run or walk, or as part of the Kids' Dash.

Held annually in late November, Run for a Cause is the largest charity fun run and walking event in the Ballarat area, with all proceeds going directly to the Ballarat Christmas Appeal, proudly supported by 3BA 102.3FM.

Ballarat Winter and Christmas Appeals

In mid-2022, the Ballarat Foundation and radio station 3BA 102.3FM announced the stewardship of the Ballarat Christmas Appeal and Ballarat Winter Appeal would transfer to the foundation.

The transition of the appeals will ensure the legacy built by 3BA over more than 40 years will live sustainably utilising the foundation's DGR1 tax status and fundraising capabilities.

The appeals directly support the Ballarat agencies of the Salvation Army, Anglicare, Uniting and St Vincent de Paul with vouchers, food, toys and goods which are provided directly to community members most in need.

The community response was incredible. In late 2022, more than \$133,000 was raised through corporate, individual and in kind donations, with tens of thousands in toys, food, clothing and other necessities also contributed by community members.

Ballarat Women's Fund

Individuals will be given the opportunity to become members of the Ballarat Women's Fund, with the aim of raising \$50,000 in the first year.

Half of the funds raised annually through memberships will be directed into an annual grant distribution. The recipients of the grant will be determined at an event in March 2024 where members will hear presentations from three final applicants and vote for their preferred project. The winner will receive a minimum of \$20,000 and the two finalists \$2500 each and support with project development within the supporter network.



PROGRAMS

The Ballarat Foundation delivers multiple operational programs:

Dolly Parton's Imagination Library

A highlight of the Ballarat Reads program is Dolly Parton's Imagination Library – a program which delivers a free book to program participants every month from birth to age five. More than 320 participants are currently enrolled in the program.



Back to School Vouchers

Hundreds of \$50 vouchers are delivered annually to support hundreds of families through primary schools in the Ballarat region. In 2022, the Ballarat Foundation partnered with UFS Ballarat and Child and Family Services (Cafs) to extend the program delivery to target support to children in care.

Workplace Giving

Workplace Giving, a program of Ballarat Foundation United Way Inc delivers more than \$80,000 in contributions through individual payroll donations across the community. Workplace Giving provides an avenue for business to match employee giving, delivering funds which support the Ballarat Foundation's programs and grants.

Volunteering Ballarat

Volunteering Ballarat is the peak body for volunteering for the City of Ballarat, Moorabool Shire, Golden Plains Shire, Pyrenees Shire and Hepburn Shire. It is a resource to help the community promote volunteering opportunities and to help those groups and organisations seeking volunteers.



L2P Program

The TAC L2P program is delivered in the Ballarat, Hepburn and surrounding communities. The program is free for eligible young people aged 16-21 years. The young learners are matched with fully licensed volunteer mentors and have access to a sponsored vehicle, which they can use to obtain supervised driving experience. The Ballarat program is the second largest in the state, with more than 100 participants funded.



A TRUSTED FOUNDATION

The Ballarat Foundation is a trusted and renowned charity in the Ballarat community. Our financial records are transparent and reported annually to our supporters and to state and national regulatory bodies.

Our funds held in perpetuity total more than \$4 million across 15 sub funds established by individuals or businesses.

These funds are invested to deliver income which is utilised to finance our community grants.

Our share portfolio is managed by JBWere – Australia’s leading not-for-profit partner investment manager. The management of all the Ballarat Foundation’s investments is governed by a stringent investment policy which precludes investment in unethical businesses or operations.

The policy includes conservative measures which ensure a diversity of stocks and funds to protect the value of the total investment.

Finance manager Melissa McShane-Murphy has more than decade of experience leading finance teams at not for profit and commercial businesses. Melissa is supported by our finance committee which is led by Treasurer Nigel Jarvis.

The foundation’s asset base includes the ownership of 7-9 Lydiard Street South which is proposed for redevelopment to create a vibrant and innovative community hub – known as the Ballarat Community Hub.

Sub fund holders and supporters receive regular updates on the value of their investment and the projects which are funded through the grants allocations process.

The Ballarat Foundation will recognise donations – if the donor wishes to have their contribution celebrated – through social and mainstream media, our extensive supporter database, at public events and in our annual report.

By giving to the Ballarat Foundation, you can be assured that the funds are being professionally managed and are directly impacting better outcomes for your community.

MAKE A DIFFERENCE

There are many ways you can support the vital work of the Ballarat Foundation. By giving to our foundation, you are joining a community which collectively drives positive change.

Create Your Own Sub Fund

Creating a sub fund in the name of you, your family or a business creates a positive legacy which keeps giving back to the Ballarat community.

All sub funds are held in perpetuity and pooled for investment purposes utilising the services of premier investment firm JB Were's dedicated not-for-profit investment support team.

The income from those investments are distributed annually to enable positive community impact. This means every dollar donated to a sub fund works for the Ballarat community year after year.

Donors can remain anonymous or choose their level of involvement and profile. Opportunities will be provided to donors to attend forums, grant allocation assessments and information sessions. Regular updates on fund balances, fees and funded outcomes are provided by the Ballarat Foundation.

Sub funds are governed by an agreement which sets out how the fund will be managed and is signed by all relevant parties.

Sub fund options include:

Named Fund: Recognises an individual donor or family through an initial gift or through regular donations. Your Named Fund will be recorded annually in the Foundation's Annual Report unless anonymity is requested.

Corporate Fund: Recognises the contribution of a business to the local community through an initial gift or through regular donations. Your Corporate Fund will be recorded annually in the Foundation's Annual Report and can be promoted within your networks.

Specific Purpose Fund: To support a specific cause or charitable purpose within the Ballarat community.

Select the Ballarat Foundation as a beneficiary in your will

Leaving a bequest in your will to a community foundation is a way of ensuring ongoing impact to the lives of those living in your community with the greatest need.

There are a number of options when giving: your gift may be given during your lifetime, as a one-off donation, over a period of time, or provided for in your Will as a bequest (or a combination of these options).

Upon committing to the Foundation, you can select to have your gift honoured in a Named Fund. This ensures the donation is allocated to your family name or a person of significance.

Gifts made during a donor's lifetime are tax deductible.

Donate regularly to our General Fund

The Ballarat Foundation General Fund acts in the same way as a sub fund – acquiring and securing funds from many regular donors who wish to support our causes without the responsibility or recognition of an individual or named sub fund.

Donate regularly to our Specific Purpose Funds

Our established specific purpose funds support responses to important community issues identified in the Ballarat Foundation's Vital Signs study.

Donations can be made to:

Housing Support Fund: Designed to support pilot projects and support services to break the cycles of homelessness



Feed Ballarat Fund: Established to promote innovative and new responses to food insecurity

Ballarat Women's Fund: Created in 2023 to respond to family violence, employment opportunities for women, health and education.

James Petrie Fund: Established in the name on James Petrie, who sadly passed away in 2022 following a battle with mental health. This fund supports local responses to mental health initiatives and youth engagement.

Program and Event Sponsorships
